The Right Tool for the Job

Taking a break from the usual "club business" of the monthly REport... These hilarious automotive tool definitions come to us courtesy of **Peter Egan**, one of my all-time favorite automotive writers. This piece originally appeared in *Road & Track*, April 1996 in Peter's column, *Side Glances*.

Hammer: Originally employed as a weapon of war, the hammer nowadays is used as a kind of divining rod to locate expensive car parts not far from the object we are trying to hit.

Mechanic's Knife: Used to open and slice through the contents of cardboard cartons delivered to your front door; works particularly well on boxes containing convertible tops or tonneau covers.

Not an SCCA member? No problem. Free weekend memberships available for the Road Rally program.



SCCA NATIONAL CONVENTION REPORT-Jack Hanifan

Annual Meeting-The outgoing members of the Board of Directors were presented with mementos and the new incoming members were presented including our own Area 10 Director Earl Hulbert.

The various branches of the Club gave their annual reports. Pro Racing announced they have a 25 year agreement for Trans-Am. They also announced the loss of several race series and a loss of 756K for 2016. Yes a loss of 756 thousand dollars in 2016. SCCA Enterprises is doing well with the introduction of SRF3. SCCA Inc finished the year 135K over expectations.

I attended the following meetings:

Club Race Speed Dating- A meeting for all race specialties to increase the ability to work together.

Building a Successful Race Series with Gary Pitts and Chris Mosley- This meeting allowed racers from different parts of the country to exchange ideas and formats used to promote racing series. The NeDiv Divisional series was used as a benchmark for a successful series.

True meaning of Stewardship- This meeting dealt with the duties of Stewards, proper procedures with an emphasis on being competitor friendly.

Risk Management Insurance- This Q&A session with our insurance carriers dealt on waiver procedures and our responsibilities as organizers. Our Insurance partner K&K Insurance Group provided their Risk Management Team led by Senior Vice President Paul Underwood. This is the session where we found out that our Solo and Rally events have been using the wrong waiver form. We have taken steps to resolve this.

Club Racing Town Hall- This two hour session dealt with current issues in club racing. The major topic of discussion was the Runoffs at Indy. As you probably know, Eric Prill had sent out a memo about paddock space and the possible need to restrict entries. Eric made it clear that this would be an absolute last option. He even said he would give up his space before another driver was not allowed entry.

Track Review- This was a three hour session dealing with Track Safety. As one of the Track Reviewers in the North East, I have to review tracks for safety items. The class dealt with everything from pavement markings to tire wall construction.

Incentive Programs- Chris Robbins, a Steward, driver and Southwest Airlines Executive, discussed all types of incentives ranging from swag to scheduling. This was an excellent presentation, all participants were engaged.

Leadership Summit Closing Session-This was a wrap up of the various leadership meetings with comments for improving next year.

The National Convention ended with the Hall of Fame Banquet.


It's time to start preparing for the 2017 Solo season!

For those of you that need a helmet for the upcoming season, there is a new choice for you. While looking for a new helmet for son Johnathon at Christmas time, I had a hard time finding a Snell helmet. Thanks to a knowledgeable salesman at a local motorcycle shop, he let me know of a new rating that looks to be replacing the Snell standard. It is a R22.05 rating. So this will give a few more choices in your search.

Below is the relevant section from the SCCA rulebook (Jan, 2017). Please verify your choice of new helmet at https://www.scca.com/pages/solo-cars-and-rules before purchasing. Also, while you are looking up the helmet rules take a look at the rest of the rules to make sure that nothing that applies to you has changed.

4.3 DRIVER'S SAFETY EQUIPMENT

4.3.1 Helmets Helmets meeting the following standards must be worn while on course: All helmets meeting the latest or two immediately preceding Snell Foundation standards (SA2015, SA2010, SAH2010, SA2005, M2015, M2010, M2005, K2015, K2010, K2005); SFI standards 31.1, 41.1, 31.1A, 31.2A, 41.1A, 41.2A; ECE R22.05; FIA standards 8859-2015, 8860-2010, 8860-2004; or British spec BS6658-85 type A are acceptable. Full face or modular helmets shall be worn while competing in an openwheel car, formula car, or kart. Face shield, goggles, or similar face protection (conventional eyeglasses are not sufficient) shall be worn while competing in any other vehicle with less than the standard-size windshield. Formula Junior drivers must use helmets meeting the above, SFI 24.1 (Youth Helmets), Snell CMR2007 (Children's Motorsports Restricted), or Snell CMS2007 (Children's Motorsports Standard) specifications. Also, Formula Junior helmets must be of closed face design incorporating full face shields and chin bars. For maximum protection, helmets must fit securely and should provide adequate peripheral vision. The chin strap must be securely fastened. Loaner helmets should be available to vehicle occupants not having their own.



SOLO Report II

The Solo Advisory Committee met on February 11th to go over the upcoming year. We picked a good day as it was in between snowstorms and I was able to be there for the whole meeting.

We had one change to the committee: Phil Shoemaker has stepped down; I would like to thank Phil for his service. We chose not to replace him. Last year we added two members, for a total of 10. With Phil stepping down we now have 9 members in the committee. This is a good number because it removes the possibility of a tie vote.

Your SAC members for this year are; Aashish Vemulapalli, Andy Furlong, Bruce Kosakoski, Eric Smith, Lyndon Peck, Miguel Teixeira, Skyler Weisenburger, Tom Moeller, and myself.

At the meeting we changed the Supplemental rules slightly. The entry fees this year have changed due to the increase in temporary memberships increase. Members will continue to be \$30, but Non-Members increased \$5 to \$50 due to SCCA raising their tariff by that amount. We also changed the way a few things were worded; nothing major though.

We also went over the schedule. We have decided to go with a 7 event season this year. We are also planning for 2 test and tunes. Keep an eye on the website for the schedule. I will put it out as soon as I get confirmation. If all goes right, we will have an earlier start this year with our first event at the end of April.

There is also talk of doing an Annual Tech session at the Annual Tech Parties. In the past, these events have been for the Club Racers. To try and close the gap between the two groups, we are planning on joining them. Annual Tech is reserved for SCCA members, but all are encouraged to attend. April 1 it will be at North Country Imports. April 8 will be at Bob Karl's Sales and Service.

Tire Rack Northeast Championship Solo Comes to Devens, Mass, June 16th - 18th

"Tire Rack SCCA Solo Championship Tour events take place over three days on two separate courses. The opening day consists of Test and Tune opportunities, as well as a social gathering. Then on the second day, competitors each get three chances to drive one course, and on the third day get three runs on another course." (SCCA).

The Championship Tour is a step up from our regional events, with longer, multiple, courses and a sizable number of freakingly-serious competitors. There are also opportunities to offset expenses through product (use) contingency awards. MoHud Soloers planning to compete at Devins should check out details via the SCCA website.

Racing Colours: The Book




Somewhat different from most books devoted to automobile racing, *Racing Colours* is collection of digital images evoking the liveries of racers from a 1908 Panhard-Levassor to the Le Mans-winning 2009 Peugeot 908HDi. It's a small book, each page being 7" by 7", but the purity of the graphics are so very impressive. Each of the 76 plates is accompanied by a page with a relevant quote. The appendix illustrates Owen's notes and sketches for a number of the plates. A sampling follows this page.
