Getting students is not a problem; we've already got a wait-list. The key ingredient is having plenty of instructors. Ask any Street Survival instructor around and they'll tell you that participation in this school is among the most rewarding activities you can take part in. The kids arrive in the morning looking aggrieved at having been roused from their beds earlier than noon. But within seconds of their behind-the-wheel instruction they are alert and 100% engaged. Teaching them to understand car control is fun and gratifying.

For in-car coaches, we're looking for people with car control skills and experience with AutoX, car control clinics, high performance driving, racing etc. We can provide in-car training as well (riding in the back seat with an experienced instructor). We could use non-coach volunteers as well, for things like shagging cones and traffic flow control.

Saratoga Automobile Museum will hold its annual car auction on Friday and Saturday, September 24th and 25th, in the SPAC parking lot. Volunteers are needed not just those days, but starting Tuesday the 21st, for tasks such as shuttling the consigned cars to staging areas, keeping track of sold and unsold cars in the post-auction corral, and helping jump-start reluctant barn-finds. MoHuders who've worked the auction in past years have told great stories about cool cars they've pushed, started or driven. Word is that some 350 cars will across the auction bock this year.

In other SAM news, as they approach their 20th anniversary, *Horsepower Magazine* has been retooled as *Curated*, featuring slick artwork as well as a feature stories. The first issue highlights many of the street Porsches from the collection of Steven Harris as photographed by James Lippman and exhibited in the "Rare Air" show scheduled to close after Travers Weekend.

MoHud gets its due in this first issue of *Curated* by way of an article by Rich Alexander on the restoration of the Museum's #85 Formula Vee in colors raced by the late David Riggi.

Of course you'd know all this already if you were a supporter- member of the Museum, as we've all received a copy of *Curated* in the mail. Can't promise the same in the future, but you ought to consider membership to keep them going.

September 17th and 18th will mark the 95th anniversary of automobile racing at the Altamont Fairgrounds. Promoted by Ralph Hankinson, six "big cars" (sprint cars) showed up for the inaugural two days over a half-mile track that until that time was the exclusive domain of horse racing trotters and pacers.

The first race on Friday the 17th featured four cars: Bob Price in a Chrysler, George La Motte in a Rajo (Ford Model A block), James Ewers in a Studebaker, and Ralph Baker in his Hudson Special. Despite an early accident that sent a spectator to the hospital, the ten-lap race saw three lead changes, with Price coming in first in a time of 6 minutes, 54 seconds. The second event, a "time trail" was won by Roy Ketcham in his Chicago Special. His winning lap time was reported as 22 .1/5 seconds – a supposed statewide record for a half-mile track. In the light of record lap times at the Fairgrounds in following years, it seems the lap was more likely 32 seconds plus, not 22 seconds plus.

There's a legend around Altamont that the first automobile race was held at the Fairgrounds in 1910, but research by the KO editor has deflated that claim. A race was advertised, but was called due to rain; wouldn't want a wet horse track to be churned up by heavy automobiles...

The Gypsons, Ken Sr. and Ken Jr., are the best known MoHud connections to racing at Altamont. Racer Ken Sr. was MoHud's second RE, back in 1957. Young Ken still has at least one "big car" in his collection.

Another MoHud connection is Greg Rickes, who appears to have driven a Formula 500 Cooper or some such in an exhibition race a few years back. Perhaps we can get Greg to elaborate on this.

Thompson Under the Lights - August 21st

The second annual New England Region Midnight Madness regional races, including the Heritage Racing Group, ran on Saturday the 21st on a hot day and night that foretold the coming of Hurricane Henri. Midnight Madness consists of qualifying in the morning, a race for groups in the afternoon, then a night race for each group under trackside lights -- no car headlights allowed.

MoHud Racing was represented by Ed Zemek (SpecMiata2) and Mike Harmuth (Historic Racing Group 1). Other MoHuders spotted in the darkness included EJ Smith and Sal Baisly flagging, Rich Welty in Tech, and the Maleckis occasionally seen pushing a car up the tech scales and taking pictures.

Menands. Motorsports, and MoHud History

On a recent excursion around town the always observant Aashish Vemulapalli made note of an array of orange pylons laid out in the parking lot at 431 Broadway in Menands. Apparently this was a set-up for some sort of emergency vehicle training exercise.



Not surprisingly this set off an on-line conversation musing about the prospects for a new autocross site.

Like so many things in MoHud this was another example of the past as prologue.

In the late 1940s oval track racing for "midget" cars was booming, and the Albany area was not immune to the craze. A quarter-mile paved oval was constructed in Menands at what would eventually become 431 Broadway.

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
Menands, II...



This location had the unique feature of sharing the property with a drive-In movie theater. The auto races would run mid-week, a slow time for movie-goers, and utilized the drive-in property for spectator parking. The speedway was a popular attraction for many years. In the following photo you can see the silhouette of the drive-in screen in the background.

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Menands, III...



The speedway operated from 1948 until 1965. The first auto race I remember going to was at Empire Raceway, in the summer of 1963. The program included not only the usual local stock cars but the travelling series of the American Race Drivers Club midgets. It was a glittering field in terms of both cars and drivers, including an up-and-coming talent out of Nazareth PA by the name of Mario Andretti.

A few old-style sports car gymkhanas were held on the track, and our dear friend Jack Hanifan played high school football on a grid-iron set out in the track's infield.

he lure of commerce inevitably overcame the draw of seasonal auto racing and outdoor movies. The property was razed to construct a discount department store. But that wasn't the end of this story.

With local "blue laws" in effect into the late 1960s the vast parking lot at "Two Guys" Shopping Plaza became a prime location for MoHud autocross events.

This popular location met its end when Sunday shopping became a priority, if not necessarily a necessity. In the dynamics of a market economy "Two Guys" eventually faced its own demise in the market place and the property moved through various iterations of vacancy and re-purposing, but alas motorsport has yet to make it's return to this historic venue.
